But as she reads of the sinister dealings and horrendous misunderstandings that spelled out tragedy for the rescued bride, Hedio fears that her own life is paralleling Annie's, and that history is repeating itself with Jacques' kin. Among the family's papers, Hedio encounters three other strong-willed women who helped shape Jacques

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Ducharme's life—Omah, the freed slave who took her place beside him as a river raider; his second wife, Laura, who loved money more than the man she married; and Laura and Jacques' daughter, Maddie, a fiery beauty with a nearly uncontrollable appetite for love. Their stories, together with Annie's, weave a haunting tale of this mysterious, seductive, and ultimately dangerous man, a man whose hand stretched over generations of women at a bend in the river where fate and desire collide. *The River Wife* richly evokes the nineteenth-century South at a time when lives changed with the turn of a card or the flash of a knife.
