Diverticula are small bulges or pockets that can develop in the lining of the intestine as you get older. Most people with diverticula do not get any symptoms and only know they have them after having a scan for another reason.

Diverticular disease is a condition where small pouches, called diverticula, form in the lining of your bowel and push out through the bowel wall, causing symptoms. Symptoms may include, for example, pain in your tummy or a change in bowel habits. If you have diverticula that don ' t cause any symptoms, this is known as diverticulosis.

Diverticular disease This term is used when diverticula cause intermittent, lower tummy (abdominal) pain or bloating (without swelling (inflammation) or infection - discussed later). Diverticula are small, bulging pouches that can form in the lining of your digestive system. They are found most often in the lower part of the large intestine (colon). Diverticula are common, especially after age 40, and seldom cause problems. The presence of diverticula is known as diverticulosis (die-vur-tik-yoo-LOE-sis).

Diverticulosis and diverticulitis are two conditions that occur in your large intestine (also called your colon). Together they are known as diverticular disease. Both share the common feature of diverticula. Diverticula are one or more pockets or bulges that form in the wall of your colon.

Urgent colonoscopy to establish the diagnosis and treat the source of bleeding if there is diverticular haemorrhage. Planned colonoscopy or CT colonography in selected patients after resolution of acute complicated diverticulitis symptoms, to exclude alternative diagnoses such as inflammatory bowel disease, ischaemic colitis, or colorectal cancer.

Suspect diverticular disease if a person presents with one or both of the following: intermittent abdominal pain in the left lower quadrant with constipation, diarrhoea or occasional large rectal bleeds (the pain may be triggered by eating and relieved by the passage of stool or flatus)

Diverticular disease occurs when diverticula become inflamed, known as diverticulitis, or bleed. They typically occur in the sigmoid colon, which is a common place for increased pressure. The left side of the colon is more commonly affected in the United States while the right side is more commonly affected in Asia.

Diverticulitis indicates inflammation of a diverticulum or diverticula and may be caused by infection. Other complications of diverticular disease include segmental colitis, lower gastrointestinal bleeding, infection, abscess, perforation, peritonitis, fistula formation, and obstruction.
